Sealing Outdoor Connectors

The following method of weather-proofing outdoor connectors was taught to me by a tower contractor.

The procedure used is the use of black electrical tape in a unconventional manner though. The first wrap of tape, in weatherproofing a connector, is to wrap the connector with the black electrical tape "sticky side" out. Ensure that the tape is stretched enough to fill the low spots on the connector. Now wrap the connector in the usual manner with the weather seal product (self vulcanizing tape). Place two overlapping layers of electrical tape over the weather seal. Self vulcanizing tape may be purchased at home improvement stores such as Lowes, Home Depot, etc.

Note: when the end of a layer is to be finished, do not pull the tape, instead cut the tape. If the tape

is pulled it will tend to shrink back and start to unravel.

If the connection must be opened, everything peels off with a careful knife cut and with no effort whatsoever and nothing sticks to the parts involved. Using black tape in this manner requires nothing more to put in your tool box.

I have opened connectors and splices after many years using this method and have seen that they looked as good as the day they were originally done.

Digital "Flavour of the Month"

There are more than 20 Digital Modes (not including variations within each). If you listen outside of the Amateur Radio bands you will hear even more strange warblings and chirpings. After some listening, your curiosity may get the better of you and say to yourself "digital mode just isn't enough".

Whether you have the digital bug and are already watching the digital waterfall or just starting to get curious, there are resources available to satisfy your craving for more digital mode information. Although a digital setup for your radio (digital software and a sound card interface) will provide you with both a visual (waterfall display) and auditory clues to help you to identify the culprit, you can do so by ear with experience. That being said, I have seen nothing on the waterfall and heard nothing but atmospheric noise, perfect copy will appear on the screen as if by magic.

Each digital mode has unique characteristics that result in a specific visual and/or auditory fingerprint.

The information is of a general nature and provides a link to a sound file of a typical transmission. Another useful list of digital mode sound files may be found at:

If you have a waterfall display to work with, www.w1hkj.com is great place to start your search. Click on the "Sights and Sounds of Digital Modes" link to open a page containing both waterfall waveforms and sound bites of 14 different ham radio digital modes.

An extensive collection of non-ham modes may be found at www.kb9ukd.com/digital. This site includes over 100 different digital modulation sound samples covering everything from aircraft telemetry and railway crossing signal data. Also of note on this site is sound file for SSTV (Slow Scan Television).

It is now time, to tune into and enjoy the wonderful and amazing world of Digital Modes.

World Cup 2018 Football Amateur Radio Marathon

June 1 to July 15

For immediate release:

The special call sign VB18FIFA will be on the air from June 1 to July 15 for the 2018 FIFA World Cup in Russia.

Members of the Maritime Contest Club (MCC) will represent Canada and Radio Amateurs of Canada at the request of the Russian Amateur Radio Union (SRR), the national organization of Radio Amateurs in Russia.

The SRR has partnered with Amateur organizations in 60 countries to organize special event stations. QSLs will be via Logbook of The World (LotW) only, and the award for working FIFA stations is available from the SRR online at: <http://fwc18.hamlogs.net>. Background information:

"The FIFA World Cup, often simply called the World Cup, is an international association football competition contested by the senior men's national teams of the members of Fédération Internationale de Football Association (FIFA), the sport's global governing body. The championship has been awarded every four years since the inaugural tournament in 1930, except in 1942 and 1946 when it was not held because of the Second World War. The current champion is Germany, which won its fourth title at the 2014 tournament in Brazil."
